## Members' meetings

Over the winter months there has been a busy programme of talks.

In November Peter Denison-Edson gave a thought-provoking talk entitled, 'What was 'Roman' about Romano-British Swaledale?' He was followed in December by Stuart Ross, from Northern Archaeological Associates, who gave a fascinating presentation on the archaeological discoveries made during the upgrading of the A1 between Leeming and Barton.

Sue Nicholson gave a talk on Hadrian's Wall in January and subsequently offered to run a study session on Latin inscriptions. Those who attended learnt to distinguish between memorial and altar stones, as well as translate some of the more straightforward inscriptions.

In February Jane Sammells, from Curriculum Kitchen, gave a very different and entertaining talk. Jane is interested in food and cooking across the ages and delivers themed-based, hands-on workshops to schools and other organisations. She explained some of the techniques the Romans used to cook their food, which would have included such delicacies as edible snails, dormice and fermented fish sauce. The audience were relieved they didn't have to sample these! They did however get to try (and take home) a selection of excellent desserts from across the ages, including a 'Bishop Au(c)kland custard tart', the main ingredients of which were mashed potatoes, dried fruit, spices and eggs.





In May the presentation was given by Tony Metcalfe from Altogether Archaeology, a community group, based in the Northern Pennines. Tony spoke about

the group's excavations at Well Head, Holwick, a deserted medieval settlement, in Teesdale.
